As I write this, we are just getting ready for "docks in." Our boating season has started off with some great weather. So much so, in fact, that a number of members boated to our Fitting Out Party.

The financial situation of the Minnetonka Power Squadron continues to improve. The Fitting Out Party was an amazing success and I would like to thank Karen Christenson for putting it all together, and all of the many members who donated prizes, and who bid high! To further improve our finances, early payment of your membership dues and, if you use Streater Cove, your Island Use fee, will be greatly appreciated.

As we move into this boating season, I continue to be reminded of one of the main goals of the US Power Squadrons: promoting safe boating through education. A little over a year ago, a motion was passed at a General Membership Meeting which requires all members to take and pass the Seamanship class in order to qualify for an Island Use sticker. The motion included a two year grace

period which will expire this Fall. Plans are shaping up to offer the Seamanship class this Summer at Streater Cove. If you have not taken Seamanship, I encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity.

Your Executive Committee continues to look for ways to improve Streater Cove. Over the winter, Xcel Energy worked on upgrading many of the poles

Let's Be Safe Out There LT. Jeff Schott, AP

As the 2009 boating season begins, let's take a moment to consider the serious side of boating. A moment of inattention can result in unfortunate consequences. The table below shows factors contributing to accidents (national data from 2007, compiled by U.S. Coast Guard). Most of these causes are under our control, and can be prevented.

Our advanced grade, and elective courses provide an opportunity to gain skills that can reduce these factors and improve boating safety. Of particular importance are our public boating courses. While the USPS, and local Squadrons, represent a large number of boaters, we are a small part of the total boating population. The information contained in our new ABC-3 course and earlier Squadron Boating

Course and Boat Smart courses can help improve the knowledge and capability of those who take the course.

We have a group of VERY dedicated instructors that teach public boating courses, but to offer another class, or two, to reach more people, we could use additional instructors. A FREE course, Instructor Development, will qualify you to teach our public courses. So, to make the boating world safer, pass on your boating knowledge to others, and get a great deal of inner satisfaction by helping people become better boaters, consider becoming an instructor. . . . You can be a contributor to both our education AND civic activities, and even get a merit mark.

Fuel Your Vessel ...Safely Lt. Bob Brown, C

Serious accidents can occur when fueling. Never fuel at night unless it is an emergency. If you must refuel after dark, use only electric lights. To protect the water environment, try to refuel away from the water or on a commercial fueling ramp.



Before beginning to fuel, you

should turn off anything that might cause a spark—engines, fans, or electrical equipment. Shut off all fuel valves and extinguish all open flames, such as galley stoves and pilot lights. Close all windows, ports, doors, and other openings to prevent fumes from entering the boat. While filling the fuel tank, use caution and fill the tank



slowly to avoid spilling fuel into the boat's bilge or into the water. After fueling, open all

windows, ports, doors, and other openings. If your boat is equipped with a power ventilation system (exhaust blower), turn it on for at least four minutes before starting your engine. This

will help eliminate fuel vapors in the bilge. Before starting the engine, sniff the bilge and engine compartment for fuel vapors.



If possible sniff the output area of your power ventilation system, (exhaust blower).

You should continue ventilating until you cannot smell any fuel vapors.

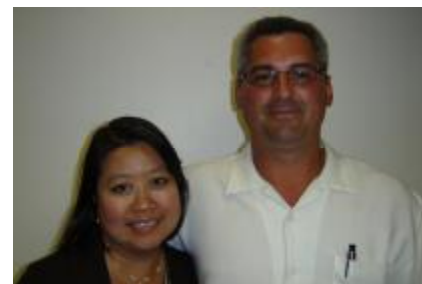
Tony and Lynn Jewett

John and Holly Raby

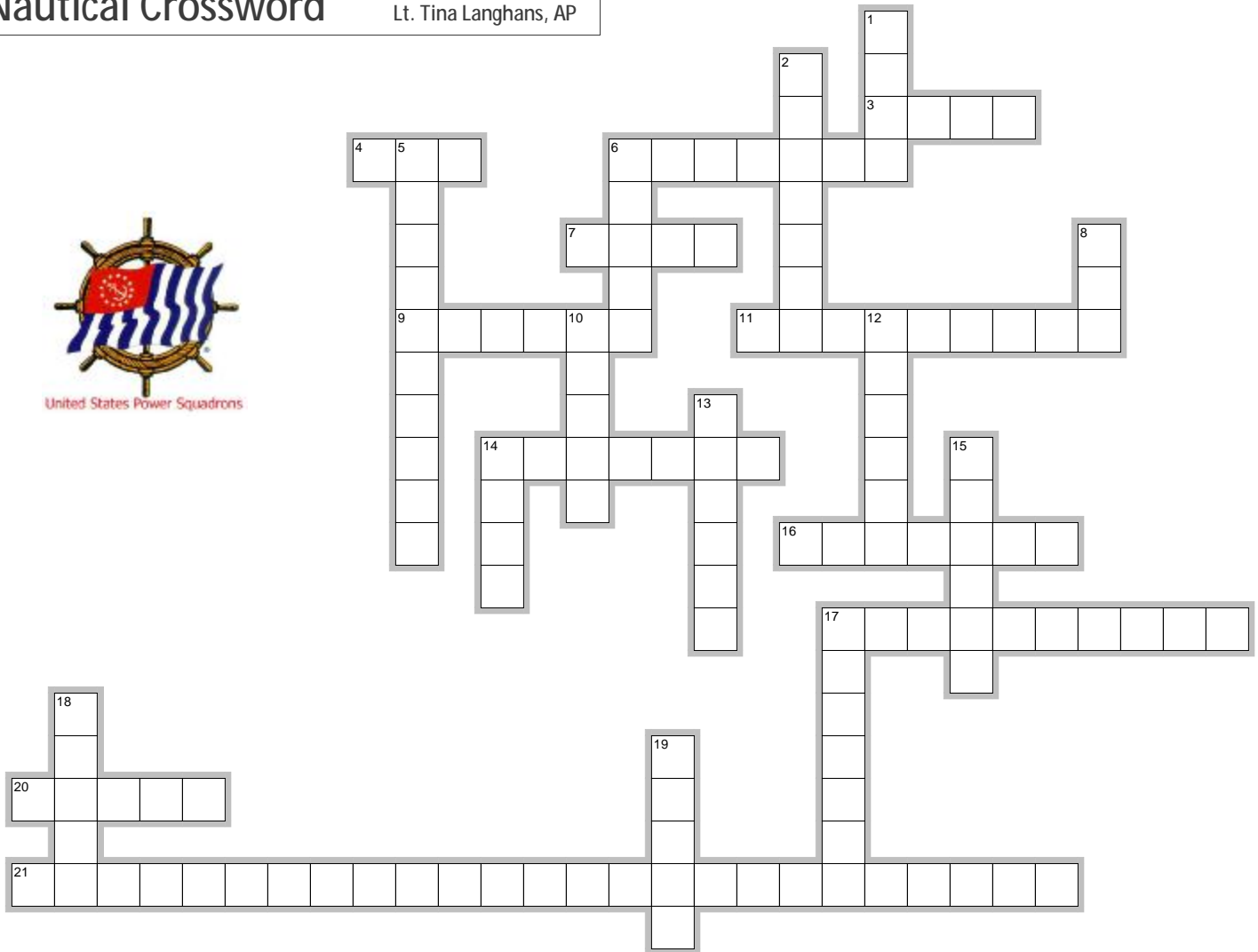

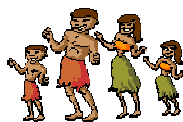

The village is only 10 miles from Oshkosh, 45 miles south of Green Bay, 90 miles north of Milwaukee, and is located in the heart of Wisconsin's vacation land. Due to the success of the previous rendezvous here in 2005, the District Bridge plans on expanding the theme of affordable, fun for all the family, and boating activities.

The Friday night event will be an "Over the Transom" cookout competition, where each squadron will prepare their own favorite fare in the tailgating theme. The food will be judged by an impartial, but hungry, group of judges. You will need to bring your own means of cooking and food for this event, but bring enough to share. Prizes may or may not be awarded.

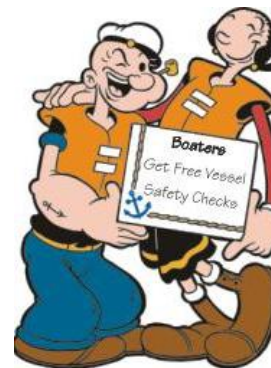
